Provincewide Updates



Moravian Disaster Response (MDR) Updates

Hurricane Melissa in Jamaica – The Board of World Mission (BWM) has received a second, more detailed report from the Provincial Board of the Moravian Church, Jamaica and Cayman Islands Province (MCJCI) about the needs following Hurricane Melissa. The extent of the destruction is becoming clearer as assessments are conducted in more communities.

According to this latest report, 37 of the province's 64 Moravian congregations have been affected in some way, and nearly 50 church-owned properties—including churches, manses, and schools—have reportedly suffered some degree of damage. Of these, five buildings have been completely destroyed, 16 have lost their roofs entirely, 14 have partial roof damage, and 13 have minor damage. The Provincial Board currently estimates \$1.6 million USD in damage to church-owned properties. This amount does not include the additional funds needed for the church's broader community response.

The Provincial Board also stated it needs more financial help to keep paying salaries for pastors and staff, which is about \$25,000 each month. It also needs funds for relief and rebuilding supplies for congregations and families. The Board continues to work hard—mobilizing volunteers, sharing information, finding temporary housing, and securing new worship spaces for congregations whose buildings are no longer usable.

The devastation extends far beyond church properties. It is estimated that 150,000–200,000 homes across Jamaica have been damaged or destroyed, placing immense pressure on local communities and the national response.

Thanks to the generosity of many donors, the Board of World Mission has now sent \$40,000 to the MCJCI Disaster Response Fund to support the Provincial Board's immediate efforts. Additional support remains urgently needed.

Volunteer Interest Sign-Up

Plans are underway to repair and outfit Camp Hope (Jamaica) as a future hosting site for short-term mission teams. While this process is in the very early stages, we have already heard from many individuals, congregations, and groups eager to assist with relief and rebuilding efforts.

In a remarkable expression of faithful partnership, the London Moravian Church in Cambridge, Wisconsin, has established a \$30,000 matching challenge for Hurricane Melissa relief. This small congregation has not drawn from its endowment fund in eight years, yet felt profoundly called to act in this moment. The leadership of the London Moravian Church has invited Moravians across North America to join them in meeting—and prayerfully exceeding—this matching opportunity. All gifts designated for MDR will be matched dollar-for-dollar up to \$30,000, doubling the impact of every contribution.

A Bishop's Musings: December 2025

January is here, named after the two-faced Roman deity of beginnings and endings. depicted with one face looking forward and one face looking backward. As a Moravian Church we have a number of traditions that reflect those two views.

Some churches have a Watch Night Service on New Year's Eve to mark the end of one year and the beginning of another. In January many of our congregations will have an Annual Church Council Meeting at which time they will report the highlights of 2025. Some congregations will use this as an opportunity to set goals for 2026.

A tradition shared in most of our congregations will be selecting a Watchword for 2026, a passage of Scripture taken from the 2026 Moravian Daily Text Book. The Watchword is to be a spiritual guide to accompany us throughout the year.

I will admit that some years I have found the Watchword I randomly selected from a basket or an old offering plate to be more meaningful and helpful than other years.

It made me wonder, "what if I chose my own Watchword for 2026, not randomly, but intentionally; what verse would I choose." After thinking about it for a time I decided I would choose Romans 12:12, "Rejoice in Hope, Be Patient in Suffering, Persevere in Prayer."

This passage reminds me to, "Rejoice in Hope," to celebrate the possibilities and potential in life; and to look beyond the uncertainty and negativity which too often clouds our attitudes.

This passage prompts me to "Be Patient in Suffering," recognizing that although difficulties and challenges are a part of life, they do not define us nor defeat us. Patience, allowing time to give us perspective, to show us options, and to allow God to open our hearts and minds with wisdom and insight often makes a huge difference for us.

This passage challenges me to "Persevere in Prayer," reminding me how important it is for me to be in daily communion with God, not only sharing my gratitude and concerns, but listening to that "still small voice" that speaks volumes to my heart and soul.

As we begin 2026, what passage of Scripture would you intentionally choose to be your Watchword for the year? If you are having trouble deciding, feel free to use Romans 12:12.

May God bless you and be with you throughout this new year.

The Lutheran Anglican Moravian (LAM) Commission met in early December in Edmonton, Alberta to continue its work toward living more completely into our full communion agreement. Blair Couch, Matt Gillard, and Betsy Miller represented the Moravian Church. Donna Gordon, an active member of the team, was unable to attend. Mark Guevarra, Assistant to the Canadian District President, attended an evening meal and fellowship time. He writes, “On a cold wintery night, it was inspiring to gather with our full communion partners for a Moravian style intercessory prayer; naming and lifting up our personal prayers, the needs of the church, the world, and our communities. Following prayer, we shared a delicious meal at one big table, as well as our faith journeys, with new friends. In this thin space, truly the Spirit of God was present among us.”

Always a rich experience, we shared in a worship service in the Indigenous tradition of smudging, which provides an opportunity for spiritual cleansing. We worked toward ways to encourage our siblings in the Labrador Province to engage more fully with their indigenous brothers and sisters across Canada.

One specific outcome of our time together was a letter to the heads of all three communions encouraging greater participation in CLAY – the Canadian Lutheran Anglican Youth Gathering – with an emphasis on inviting Moravian youth from across Canada to attend.

America 250: As we enter the 250th Anniversary Year (1776-2026) of America's declared independence, you may be interested in presenting the earliest string chamber music composed in America, written in Salem, NC, by Moravian pastor, administrator, and composer, Johann Friedrich Peter (1746-1813) in 1789. The quintets would have been composed for the Salem Collegium Musicum, but actually survive in the Philharmonic Society of Bethlehem (PA) Collection. Peter left no copy in Salem upon his departure in 1790. Six String Quintets | sheet music / score and parts | \$35 for each set of two quintets. MMF also publishes the first string chamber music composed by an American. The Three String Trios by John Antes, Moravian pastor, missionary, composer, and instrument maker, are available from MMF for \$35 per set at MoravianMusic.org.

Trinity Moravian Church: Partnership With Good Intentions Foundation

Trinity Moravian Church rests in the center of a vibrant tapestry, a neighborhood comprised of Hispanic, Caribbean, African, African American, and a small White American population. From the moment I arrived in New Carrollton, MD, I appreciated the rich diversity and recognized the many needs it brought. At a quarterly meeting of local religious leaders in New Carrollton, a survey revealed that although some families appeared financially stable, 80 percent of the population faced food insecurity. Passionate about outreach, Trinity member Phelecia Nembhard (now New Carrollton's Mayor and an elder of Trinity) connected me in mid-2024 with DeJanee and Jeffrey Fennell, founders of the Good Intentions Foundation, Inc., whose mission is to transform lives by meeting essential needs and help alleviate potential needs, which perfectly aligned with ours, "Ministering Christ's love through service, community, and hope." By August 2024, we had signed our partnership agreement.

In early September 2024, we launched our first clothing distribution outreach. There, I met an immigrant family who had journeyed from afar for the free clothes and had recently crossed the Mexican border seeking asylum in this nation. Serving them felt deeply fulfilling and exemplified our church's mission. Being Bilingual in Spanish and English opened doors within the Hispanic community, allowing me to naturally weave Spanish into the Bilingual services I launched in the Spring 2024.

In November, I requested Good Intentions to join Trinity in providing hot Thanksgiving meals. Together with family members, church volunteers, and foundation staff, we prepared and served a delicious feast. Nothing compares to sharing a table with someone who walked in off the street, fulfilling Jesus' words, "For I was hungry, and you fed me; I was naked, and you clothed me" (Matthew 25:35-40). This passage calls us to see Christ in the needy and to demonstrate our faith through compassionate action. Then, in January 2025, we distributed winter jackets and coats, offering warmth for the cold months ahead and wrapping our neighbors in Christ's love and care.

In the summer months of 2025, along with our partners, we gave away farm-fresh watermelons and corn to local families. Over the year, this partnership led to meaningful connections, particularly with the Fennell siblings. The outreach program has blessed Trinity with new members, and we remain faithful and hopeful that the Lord will continue using our congregation as vessels of God's divine love, grace, and hope throughout our neighborhood.
