Mission Minute: A Summer of Exchange Camping

This summer, the BWM supported 40 exchange campers and leaders as they traveled from six Unity Provinces to attend camps and experience the global Moravian Unity in a tangible way. At Mt. Morris in Wisconsin, participants came from Germany, Jamaica, Pennsylvania, and Florida; Youth Convo in Miami welcomed groups from Antigua, Trinidad, Jamaica, St. Thomas, and Barbados; and campers from Labrador attended Van Es in



Alberta. The exchanges brought fresh energy as youth shared songs, traditions, and stories—discovering that even small differences sparked curiosity and connection.

For many campers, the program offered first-time travel experiences. Labrador leader McKinley Winters shared how one youth marveled at the Edmonton airport: "You should have seen her facial expression—priceless!" These moments, Winters reflected, help youth imagine futures that include studying or traveling beyond their home villages. Local campers also found their worlds expanding through new friendships. One Wisconsin camper, inspired by a bond with a German peer, is now planning to study abroad.

This program isn't just about sending campers somewhere new; it's about planting seeds of connection that bear fruit in our church for years to come... and it doesn't happen by accident! The BWM coordinates travel, fosters partnerships across provinces, and provides financial support that enables international participation. Opportunity for Continuing Education for educators, seminary students, and pastors

The Association of Partners in Christian Education (APCE) will hold their annual event January 21–24 in Pittsburgh, PA. This is an outstanding event for Sunday school teachers, Christian Education Committee members, seminary students and pastors, offering 75 workshops from which to choose (addressing curriculum, social justice issues, youth ministry, children and adult spiritual formation, etc..), in addition to excellent keynote speakers and worship opportunities. (Participation is also offered on–line, with a limited number of workshops.)

Bishop Lane Sapp was part of a large group of Moravians from both Northern and Southern provinces attending last year's event in Memphis, TN. Bishop Sapp offers the following reflection: "It was one of the best events I've attended in 37 years of ministry. The worship was creative, inspirational and engaging. We were blessed by hearing the Word proclaimed by some of the most gifted preachers in the nation and the plenary sessions were extraordinary as we engaged and dug deeper into Biblical texts and topics."

The theme for this year is "Bridging the Gap – Love God, Love Self, Love Neighbor" and the following highlights the content:

"Teacher, which is the greatest commandment in the Law?" Jesus replied: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.' This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: Love your neighbor as yourself.' All the Law and the Prophets hang on these two commandments." Matthew 22:36-40

In a pluralistic society where people are at odds with each other, anger lingers beneath the surface, and many are paralyzed about how to move forward, we'd like to invite you to conversations about how to bridge the divide that separates us.

Love is not a sedentary word, it requires action. When we ask ourselves whom we love we should also look inward to how we love. Love isn't something we collect for ourselves, but an action lived out in how we express it to others through serving, understanding, and growing together despite our differences.

The Bible Study was commended to you by the Provincial Elders' Conference and the Racial Justice Team for use in congregations. We noted at that time that one of the ways the Bible Study may be used is as a sermon series. 


